As promised, the way to make your poinsettia flower during the holiday.
Poinsettias flower due to day length. st As the days normally get shorter this 米 time of year, the plant will begin flowering around Thanksgiving, depending on the variety. To achieve this, the plant must not be subjected to artificial light at night. This means that be-\* ginning around the first of October 💥 your plants need to go in a dark closet from about 5pm til 8am each day. As 米 💥 you begin to see a color change you can stop this process which should be right around Thanksgiving, maybe as 尜 尜 🗱 late as December first. Be sure to 米 💥 give them lots of light during the day 💥 to avoid a leggy plant. The poinsettia 米 is native of Mexico so it can not stand ☀ freezing temperatures and does best 米 if you can keep it in the range of 65 米 st degrees coolest to 85 hottest.
