FEBRUARY 2010 DL UPDATE

Spring Special Education Leadership Meeting

Once again this year the Georgia Department of Education (GaDOE), Divisions for Special Education Services and Supports, will partner with the Georgia Council of Administrators of Special Education (GCASE) to sponsor the Special Education Leadership Meeting on March 22- 24, 2010. The meeting will be held in Athens at the Classic Center. Your district's attendance in at least three of the sessions will be required and assigned to ensure the opportunity for participation by all special education directors. The assigned sessions include budget development/completion of the consolidated application, student record data collection and transition. Additionally, there will be targeted technical assistance sessions for some districts identified by their data for disproportionality determination or designated areas for technical assistance based on district level data. Optional sessions focused on a wide variety of topics will also be included. Some of these topics include positive behavior supports, alternative discipline, assistive technology, mathematics and ELA resources, assessment issues, accessible instructional materials, autism services, parent engagement and dispute resolution.

Special Education Directors' Forum

The January Special Education Directors' Forum was conducted via Elluminate LIVE! on January 14, 2010. Representatives from each of the GLRS regions discussed key special education issues with Nancy O'Hara and Kim Hartsell, Directors of the Divisions for Special Education at the Georgia Department of Education. Discussion topics included the proposed amendments to the State Special Education Rules and the proposed rule on the use of restraint and seclusion. A public input session on the amendments to the Special Education Rules is scheduled

for the February State Board of Education meeting with adoption as early as March. The Department is continuing to seek input from stakeholders on the proposed rule on restraint and seclusion and it is likely that the rule could be initiated as early as April.

The proposed revision to the GaDOE special education website was also discussed. Feedback was requested regarding changes that would make the site “more user friendly”. The possibility of posting the directory of special education directors on the website was also discussed. Several directors mentioned that they would like to see the directory posted on the website as they often have difficulty locating contact information for directors in other districts.

Other topics addressed at the meeting included class sizes for special education, the 2% assessment, standards-based IEPs, and special education compliance. Representatives in the forum are encouraged to share information addressed in the forum at their next regional meetings.

Timelines Summary Report

The Timelines Summary Report and Directions for FY10 are now available on the portal. Please note the changes to the form from the FY09 Report. The directions include general information as well as instructions for completing initial, redetermination, and Babies Can’t Wait (BCW) timeline summaries. The report is due no later than **July 31, 2010** to Kathy Giddens (kgiddens@doe.k12.ga.us).

Here are a few highlights of the Timelines Summary Report:

1. Indicator 12 (BCW): A title to the BCW column has been added above the BCW data column entitled “SPP/APR Indicator 12”. As you know, Indicator 12 refers to the percentage of children referred by Part C prior to age three who are found eligible for Part B, and who have an IEP developed and implemented by their third birthday. The percentage completed on time by age three (line 8) under BCW, will be the percent reported for your district on the public report.
2. Indicator 11: Indicator 11 refers to child find and includes data for both initials and BCW. This new section entitled “Summary Report-SPP/APR Indicator 11” has been added to the report. This section will automatically calculate using the data you enter in each category. You do not enter any information in this section. The percent completed on time (line 8) will be the percent reported for your district on the public report.
3. There are some additional Exceptions noted for BCW referrals based on OSEP required changes. They will be discussed at the March Spring Leadership Meeting.

Local Determinations

Each year, the Georgia Department of Education (GaDOE) makes Local Determinations using district level data for both compliance and performance indicators. The indicator data is reviewed to determine if the district met or exceeded state targets. The data used in making the determinations is available on the Special Education Annual Reports located on the GaDOE website. Districts will receive their Determination by March 1 indicating one of four levels: Meets Requirements, Needs Assistance, Needs Intervention, or Needs Substantial Intervention. The Determination for FY 10 is based on the data for the 2008-2009 school year.

There has been an amendment to the rubric used for Determinations based on several factors:

- Feedback from the Determinations Focus Group that met last summer
- Changes from OSEP in the data collection timeline and requirements for indicators that were originally outlined to rollout this year

This year, you will receive the rubric indicating the detail for FY 10 and listing the final determination your district received in FY 07- FY 09. The Rubric for FY 10 entitled “**FY1 10 Determination Attachment**” is attached as a separate document to this update. We will review the specific changes during the Director’s Elluminate scheduled for Monday, February 8, 2010.

Dispute Resolution Tip- February 2010

There are some important steps to consider when the local district or the parent believes a student should be re-evaluated to determine if a student continues to be eligible for special education services. The IDEA requires a school district to consider reevaluation every three years, however, you can assess students more frequently if the parent or district believe the eligibility re-determination is needed. The first step in considering eligibility re-determination is to obtain informed parental consent and conduct an assessment. (See Georgia State Board Rule 160-4-7.04 for exception) The next step is to provide notice for a meeting in accordance with Georgia State Board Rule 160-4-7-.06. At the meeting, **review the data** to determine if the assessment shows the child no longer meets eligibility requirements. Eligibility for special education is a two-pronged inquiry and assessments must show that the student: 1) meets eligibility requirements for a specific disabling condition; and 2) requires special education services as a direct result of that disabling condition. If the IEP Team determines the assessments and data show a student is ineligible, **provide prior written notice** (including a copy of parental rights) to the parents during or immediately following the IEP meeting at which you've discussed the student's eligibility determination. Documentation of every step in this process is critical. If parents disagree with an ineligibility determination, the district can stop providing services. The parents may then decide if they want to pursue due process

As students with disabilities show improvement, special education services are generally reduced and provided in a less restrictive environment. If the student continues to do well, this information provides additional data related to the eligibility determination. When students are found ineligible but show signs of struggling after they exit special education, take advantage of any available general education interventions. Then, assess the student and hold a 504 meeting to determine if the student is "disabled" within the meaning of Section 504 and requires Section 504 services or accommodations.

Orientation and Mobility (O&M) Services For Visually Impaired Students

The GaDOE has received questions regarding the type of certifications necessary to provide Orientation and Mobility Services (O&M) to students who are blind or visually impaired. A person is not qualified to provide O&M unless he or she has completed a college program in O&M including practicum and has received a certificate from the college or university. The Georgia Professional Standards Commission does not offer certification in O&M, therefore it will be the responsibility of the school district to ensure that the O&M specialist has the appropriate documentation of certification from the university where the O&M program was completed.

In addition, after completing their college degrees, some O&M specialists obtain national certification through the Association for the Education and Rehabilitation for the Blind and Visually Impaired (AER) as a Certified Orientation and Mobility Specialist (COMS). COMS certification is certainly an acceptable credential for O&Ms in Georgia; however, it is not required. There are approximately 25 COMS in Georgia listed on the AER website.

Teachers of the Visually Impaired who do not hold this additional O&M certification are not qualified to provide O&M services. For more information on this issue contact Kathy Segers, Program Specialist for Visual Impairments at ksegers@doe.k12.ga.us or 478-751-6208.

Georgia Braille Challenge Results

The Georgia Academy for the Blind hosted the state's Regional Braille Challenge for fifty-two students who are blind or visually impaired on January 28, 2010. The competition tested students' skills in reading, writing, proofreading and spelling in Braille. This competition is the only event of its kind for Georgia students, and it marked the first step in qualifying for the National Braille Challenge competition in June.

Kathy Segers, Program Specialist for Visual Impairments at the GaDOE, stated that the challenge gives students a chance to build their confidence and self-esteem while showing off their academic talents. They can do just as good a job, they just do it in Braille instead of print." An eighth grader from Roswell says she's been competing for eight years, and qualified for the national competition three times. She says she traveled to Macon Thursday for the fun of the event, but says the most important part is the message the event says to everyone."It demonstrates that people who are blind can also be literate, can read and write like everyone else," the student said.

Winners in the 2010 Braille Challenge were from Bibb, Bleckley, Catoosa, Clayton, Cobb, Dade, DeKalb, Fayette, Floyd, Fulton, Hall, Irwin, Johnson, Jones, Muscogee, Paulding, Putnam, Walker, and Wilkes counties and the Georgia Academy for the Blind.
